

#### **Highlights:**

- Recruited 15 new Neighborhood Contacts.
- Established a volunteer emergency radio support network.
- Submitted a feedback letter to the county highlighting the need for wildfire prevention and safe evacuation route requirements for the RVs as Alternative Housing draft ordinance.
- Sent out 37 Subscriber Education emails, thus far, on timely topics impacting members.
- Hosted educational Community Meetings on January 28, July 29, and October 29.
- Hosted a FREE Banner Mountain Green Waste Event on April 12 & April 13 that removed over 9 TONS of debris from our mountain.
- Met with county officials to discuss roadside vegetation management and grant opportunities.



- Are there gates or other barriers blocking the road?










### Route Planning – Last Steps

#### Neighborhood Get Out (GO) Plan

Steve Baker originally developed his GO Plan for use by his neighborhood. The GO Plan is now being shared as an optional template for use within your own neighborhood. The plan can be applied to most western US rural residential areas.

This GO Plan template is provided for informational purposes only. If you choose to establish a similar plan within your own neighborhood please feel free to customize it to best meet your neighborhood's needs.

As evacuation information is constantly being improved over time in Nevada County, please always consider information posted by Ready Nevada County, the Nevada County Sheriff's Office, and CALFIRE as the current best practices when developing and/or updating your neighborhood plan.



#### Neighborhood Get Out (GO) Plan

The GO Plan is posted to the Operation Unite website <u>HERE</u>.

A Neighborhood GO Plan is strongest when a core neighborhood group is organized and working together. The key elements of a strong GO Plan are:

- Prepare;
- Create good communications for monitoring wildfire conditions; and,
- Evacuate early and safely.

The goal of a GO Plan is to ensure that EVERYONE REACHES A SAFE PLACE!



#### Neighborhood Get Out (GO) Plan - PREPARE

- Organize Your Neighborhood Group;
- Build the Neighborhood Group Membership;
- Develop Situational Awareness;
- Practice Communication Inside and Outside the Neighborhood;
- Know Your Risk Tolerance and Develop Personal Responsibility;
- Develop Responsibility to each of Your Neighbors; and,
- Preparations Before a Wildfire and GO Bag Checklists.



#### Neighborhood Get Out (GO) Plan - GOOD COMMUNICATIONS

- Code Red;
- Genasys Project (formerly ZoneHaven);
- Yuba Net, KNCO, KMVR;
- Shared neighborhood group messaging application like Signal or WhatsApp;
- General Mobile Radio Service (GMRS) hand held radio;
- Word of mouth;
- Annual Neighborhood Meeting; and,
- Developing Surrounding Neighborhood Network.

Practice, practice your chosen communication method!



#### Neighborhood Get Out (GO) Plan - EVACUATE EARLY

- Prompt, thoughtful, evacuation;
- Go EARLY! This saves lives. Nothing lost if evacuation wasn't necessary;
- Have Go Bag ready and car fueled up during Red Flag Days;
- Leave your trailer at home, please. Reduces road congestion;
- Post your Evacuation Tag;
- Use group GMRS/SignalApp channel to alert neighbors you have left;
- Transmit/Text evacuation road conditions during your evacuation out of the neighborhood; and,
- Practice, practice, practice your optional evacuation routes!

#### **Distinctions**

#### Banner Mountain Firewise Community:

- Evolved into a significant and ongoing activity under the Friends of Banner Mountain "umbrella."
- Dependent upon Friends of Banner Mountain for its funding and communications via email subscriber list, facebook account and webpage.
- The Friends of Banner Mountain has "no borders", while the Banner Mountain FWC has a distinct border.

#### Banner Mountain Firewise Community:

- Benefits the community by providing:
  - EDUCATE AND ENERGIZE THE COMMUNITY
  - The Firewise Community certificate for homeowners insurance discounts
  - Access to state and federal grants and grant programs

- Requires a significant amount of effort to remain certified:
  - Annual reporting of Time and Expenses for Defensible Space/Home Hardening
  - 3-Year Goals and Implementation Plan
  - 5-year Community-wide Risk Assessment Report

#### **Maintaining Our Firewise Community Certification**

Each year, in order to maintain our Firewise Certification from the NFPA the Banner Mountain Firewise Community is required to report the time and money spent by homeowners/renters on improvements that impact the fire safety around their home. This is an honor system and no receipts are required. You can report multiple times throughout the year. The final submission happens in the middle of November each year. Reportable efforts include:

- I. Hours Spent: Home Hardening, Clearing Ladder Fuels, Trimming/Removing Trees, Hardscaping, Attending Meetings, etc.
- Money Spent: Equipment Costs, Upgrading Home Exterior, Hiring Contractors, Mileage, Equipment Fuel, etc.
